King Saul Is Jealous of David

Bible Text: 1 Sam 18:5-19:18

Bible Truth:

Everyone has his or her own role so there's no need to be jealous.

Lesson Aim:

To encourage your students to seek God's will for them and not be jealous of others.

Memory Verse:

"If anyone thinks he is something when he is nothing, he deceives himself. Each one should test his own actions."

(Gal 6:3,4)

Bible Background:

Saul wanted to kill David because he was jealous of David's popularity, yet David continued to protect and comfort Saul. Jealousy is one step short of murder. It begins by destroying a person from the inside, and then it manifests itself into harmful actions. Saul's appreciation for David turned to jealously as people began to shower David with more praises.

It soon became apparent to Saul that God was with David. This made Saul even more jealous. He feared that David would take over the kingdom.

Saul had no reason to be jealous of David. God had given Saul the abilities he needed. However, Saul became increasingly estranged from God's guidance and steeped in bitterness and jealousy.

David, however, sought God's help and acted wisely in everything. (1 Sam 18:14)

About Your Students:

Jealously is a common feeling among children. They tend to be jealous of their friends' clothing, toys, grades, popularity and so on. Sometimes parents find it very hard to manage. If the parents of these children aren't able to curb their children's feelings of jealousy, situations can become very out of hand.

Help your students by teaching them that God knows all our needs. We are all blessed in many ways. Not all of our blessings are the same, God has told us that we should not covet the possessions of others, so we should always keep His commandment in mind, and try our best to follow it.

To help your students see just how blessed they are, have them keep a weekly journal to record their blessings. Each week, at the beginning of class, have your children open their journal and write about the blessings they have received during the week. If some choose to write personal messages of thanks to God, that would be even better! Hopefully, this will help your children realize just how blessed they are, especially after they see their blessings recorded on paper. This process will help them see that there is no need to be jealous of others because God gives to all of us according to what He feels we need.

Warm-Up:

Before the lesson, ask your students to do the following questions.

- 1. Name some of the wonderful talents that God has given you.
- 2. Name some people who love you and help you.
- 3. God has helped you do many things. Name two things that you are most proud of.

Tell them that even though we know there are some things we are good at, they are all gifts from God. Encourage them to use their talents to serve God continuously.

Bible Story:

Lesson Aim:

To encourage your students to seek God's will and not to be jealous of others.

Questions and Discussion

- 3. How many of you like being punished? (No one likes to be punished.)
- 4. How did Saul react when he saw other people praising David? (He was resentful and jealous of David. These feelings kept him from loving God.)
- 5. David knew he was going to be the next king, yet he worked hard for Saul. Why do you think he wasn't jealous of Saul? (David trusted in God. He was willing to wait until it was his turn to be king.)
- 6. Did David have faith in God?

(Yes, he had faith in God and he continued to develop the talents God had given to him.)

Questions:

- 1. Who was jealous of another person in the story? Courtney, Stephanie, or both?
- 2. What happened when there was jealousy between the sisters in the family? Do you think there was a better way to handle the problem?

Activity 1:

Write Your Own Diary

Pretend you are King Saul and you want to kill David. Write down what you would say because of your jealousy towards David's success.

Pretend you are David and you know God's plan is for you to be king someday, yet you listen to God's will and serve King Saul as a commander. Write down how you feel.

Activity 2:

Group Activity

Pair up the students. Have each partner name all the admirable talents in the other, and vise-versa. Have them shift partners and repeat the activity until all students have been paired up with everyone in the class. To conclude, discuss things they have learned to improve their self-esteem.

Group Discussion:

God has created us all different. Since we don't have the same talents and abilities, God won't ask us to serve Him in the same ways. He wants us to use and cultivate the talents He has given us to carry out the wonderful plans He has for us! Now you will be given the chance to take a closer look at some other talents God has given you and to plan how you can serve God by using those talents. Help your students think beyond the talent list that they have thought about earlier. They should understand that even ordinary talents are valuable gifts from God. Informal discussion will help students get ideas from each other. If one child plans to use his drawing skills to help a friend draw, another child might teach a friend how to ride a bike.

For instance, the ability to play a musical instrument" could be used to lead a family devotion, to accompany a Saturday worship, and to entertain a younger brother or sister while parents are busy with someone else.

Caution students about making unrealistic plans. If they commit themselves to fulfill unrealistic promises, they will learn negative habits instead of positive habits.
