sinning. He hates sin and wants us to have nothing to do with it. So when we disobey His word, He "corrects" us and "guide us to the right path." We must remember that God is merciful and He forgives us when we confess our sin.

Lesson

11

Jesus Forgives Peter

Bible Text: Mk 15--16:8; Jn 20:1-8; 21:1-19 Bible Truth:

Jesus showed love and acceptance of Peter by forgiving him.

Lesson Aim:

- To encourage your students to forgive others by showing love and care to them.
- 2. To encourage your students to ask for forgiveness for wrong actions.

Memory Verse:

"If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness." (1 Jn 1:9)

Bible Background:

In this beach scene, Jesus led Peter through an experience that would remove the cloud of his denial. Although Jesus already knew what was in Peter's heart, Jesus was challenging Peter to examine his intentions, so he could truly repent. Jesus knew that real repentance and forgiveness involve more than just intentions—they involve conscious acts of the will. Jesus loved Peter enough to want him to understand and experience genuine repentance and forgiveness. Even though Peter felt sorry and had wept after denying Jesus (Lk 22:62), Jesus provided him with the opportunity to act and experience a new beginning by leaving behind his old, inadequate ways of living. Jesus asked if Peter loved Jesus with phileo love, meaning the

feelings of brotherly friendship. Jesus also asked if Peter had agape love, which involves self-sacrifice.

By commanding Peter to "feed my sheep," Jesus was encouraging Peter to respond to the spiritual needs of his Christian brothers and sisters with love, and thereby follow Jesus' example of love. Peter's life changed when he finally realized who Jesus was. Peter's chief occupation changed from fisherman to evangelist. His identity also changed from being impetuous to being a "rock"; and Peter's relationship with Jesus changed, too, he was forgiven by the Lord for his sin and Peter understood the real meaning of Jesus' resurrection.

About Your Students:

Your children are probably a little more willing than most adults to forgive others—it's a part of their longing to receive acceptance from others. Let your children know that you have observed them in the aspect of forgiveness, and that you are pleased with what you have seen, overall, if that is the case. Not that this forgiveness is referred to in a long—term sense, meaning that your children probably do not usually carry grudges against each other over an extended period of time. However, the children in your class may be prone to get angry with each other over quick and small issues—and this may be the area in which a lesson on forgiveness is needed.

Sometimes your students will have disputes over projects, and they will say mean things to each other, causing ill feelings between those involved. The key to overcoming and understanding of others is to allow them to act out scenarios involving forgiveness and understanding-give them scenarios, in which one party is misunderstood, which leads to a dispute. Then, allow your students to discuss what went wrong in the scenario, and how things could be changed for the better. By doing this, you will be teaching your children how to think like others, in order to understand where they are coming from when they have a disagreement. Too often, our children impulsively think certain others are against them, when in fact, it

isn't the case—it may be just a misunderstanding. This will help to teach a lesson on understanding and compassion.

The best example for us to follow is Jesus' example of forgiving Peter. This is the best time to review the past lesson on "The Prodigal Son" and also the lesson on "Peter's Denial of Jesus." Talk about how loving and merciful Jesus was towards Peter and how forgiving the father was towards his prodigal son. Ask your students to share time when others have forgiven them. Present "What if?" situations for your children to think through and share solutions on. By encouraging forgiveness in the R.E. classroom, your children will find it easy to ask for forgiveness from others and to forgive others, as well.

Warm-Up:

Have you ever done anything so awful--either accidentally or on purpose--that you wondered if you could be forgiven? What does it mean to be forgiven? How do you feel when you know you are forgiven?

In our Bible story, what had Peter done that might have made him doubt that Jesus would forgive him? Let's see what happened after Peter denied knowing Jesus.

Bible Story:

Very early in the morning, after the soldiers had taken Jesus to the high priest's house, the Jewish leaders were discussing what to do with Jesus. They had arrested Him and were accusing Him of various crimes, even though Jesus had never done anything wrong.

After an unfair trial, they led Him to Pilate, the Roman governor. Even though Pilate could not find any fault with Jesus, crowds of people were gathered demanding Jesus be killed. Finally, Pilate had Jesus beaten and handed over to the soldiers to be killed. The soldiers mocked Him and then dragged Him away to be crucified.

Jesus died a painful death on a cross. Two robbers hung on crosses next to Him. This kind of death was usually reserved for people who had committed terrible crimes, but Jesus was completely innocent.

After Jesus died, a man named Joseph of Arimathea bravely went to Pilate and asked for Jesus' body. Joseph wanted to show respect to Jesus by burying Him in a decent place. Joseph took Jesus' body down from the cross and carefully wrapped the body in a linen cloth. He placed Jesus' body in a tomb, which was a cave dug into a hillside. A huge rock was rolled against the entrance of the tomb.

All of Jesus' friends and family were very sorrowful. They had lost their leader and friend. They must have wondered what they would do now that Jesus was dead.

Cover the following in detail:

I. He is Alive!

- A. Mary Magdalene told Peter and John that Jesus' body was no longer in the tomb.
- B. They ran to the tomb and it was empty.
- They heard about the message the angel at the empty tomb had shared.

What Does It Mean to Forgive?

To forgive is to let go of your anger when someone has done something to hurt you and to stop wanting to blame or to punish that person.

Forgiving others takes time. Sometimes it's much harder to forgive than at other times. When you forgive, it's important to remember these four steps:

- 3. Tell them exactly what it was they did or said that hurt your feelings.
- 4. Offer to forgive first. Whether they choose to forgive you or not, you can know that you have done the right thing.
